CHAPTER I

According to Catford (1965), there are two kinds of Shift: *level shift* and *Category Shift*. A level shift focuses on changing the level from grammar to lexis or vice versa, while the Category Shift focuses on all kinds of grammatical changes. Catford brought some grammatical changes in Category Shifts, including structure shift, class shift, unit shift, and intra-system shifts. It is easier to analyze Category Shift than level shift. For this reason, the writer wanted to study the Category Shifts in the English-to-Indonesian Subtitle of *Turning Red*.

The movie entitled *Turning Red* is an animated movie produced by Pixar Animation Studio and released by Walt Disney Pictures. The movie was released in March 2022. The writer has chosen to study the movie *Turning Red* for her research because it is a film that is specifically targeted towards a young audience and as such, has a simple and easy to understand language that makes it accessible to viewers of all ages. One of the main reasons the writer was drawn to this movie is because of the valuable lessons it conveys about puberty and the importance of self-acceptance. Through its portrayal of a young girl navigating the challenges of growing up, *Turning Red* demonstrates that it is natural to have messy and imperfect sides and encourages viewers to embrace these qualities rather than feel ashamed or guilty about them. This message is particularly relevant for young people who may be struggling with feelings of insecurity and self-doubt as they go through the often confusing and sometimes difficult process of puberty. 1.5 Definition of Key Terms

To even the perspective on this study, the writer defines the following key terms:

- Translation the replacement of textual material in one language (SL) by equivalent textual material in another language (TL). (Catford, 1965)
- Translation Shift the departures from formal correspondence in the process of going from source language into target language. (Catford, 1965)
- Formal Correspondence any TL category (unit, class, element of structure, etc.) which can be said to occupy as nearly as possible, the 'same' place in the 'economy' of the TL as the given SL category occupies in the SL. (Catford, 1965)
- Structure Shift the change of grammatical pattern of linguistic items of source language when they are translated in the target language
- Unit Shift the change of a unit at one rank in the SL to a unit at a different rank in the TL
- Class Shift the change of class of a SL item to a different class in the TL (noun to adjective, verb to adjective, etc.)
- Intra-system Shift the change that occurs internally, within a system of both languages (singular and plural noun system)

Translation Quality Assessment – to determine the quality of a translation, it must first be evaluated based on three aspects: its accuracy, its acceptability, and its readability.

1.6 Scope and Limitation of the Study

This study has some limitations that the writer must interpret to avoid a broader scope. *Turning Red* has a lot of aspects that the writer can analyze, but the writer will focus on the Category Shift and the main characters of *Turning Red*: Meilin Lee, Ming Lee, Miriam, Abby, and Priya.

1.7 Organization of the Thesis

The thesis is organized into five chapters. Chapter I is the introduction, where the background, research questions, objectives, significance, key terms, scope, and organization of the study are presented. Chapter II is a review of related literature, which covers theories of translation, including the definition, translation process, translation shift, translation quality assessment, subtitle, and relevant studies.
